




MENTORING WITH ALOHA ACROSS THE ISLANDS SINCE 1963



Big Brothers Big Sisters Hawaii operates under the belief that inherent in every child is the ability to succeed and thrive in life. We make meaningful, monitored mentoring "Matches" between qualified volunteers ("Bigs") and children ("Littles"), ages 6 through 18, in communities across the state. We develop positive relationships that have a lasting effect on children. Our two program types include:

COMMUNITY-BASED MENTORING




Bigs: 18 years of age or older
Littles: ages 6 - 16 years old

Meet one-to-one 2 - 4x per month for 2-4 hours per outing

Spend time doing fun activities in the community, agreed upon by Big, Little & Parent

Support provided by a Case Manager who is there to answer questions and offer guidance

SCHOOL-BASED MENTORING



Bigs: 9th grade or older
Littles: elementary school students

Meet one-to-one in a group setting 1x per week for 1-2 hours

Spend time doing homework, playing games, participating in fun activities

A Case Manager is on site to answer questions, provide support and facilitate activities

Big Brothers Big Sisters of Hawaii Island - Little Brother Heiden & Big Sister Chereese

Big Sister Chereese and Little Brother Heiden are matches at the Big Brothers Big Sisters Keaau Elementary School Program. Although Chereese is a high school student and Heiden is much younger, the two have many things in common and Chereese shares that they carry on "fun conversations about simple and important things." Heiden says he feels "safe and comfortable" when he is with Chereese and describes his Big Sister as a "funny, kind, helpful, and caring person who likes to share." While together, Chereese helps Heiden focus on schoolwork and always finds a way to make their time together very special. Chereese puts a smile on Heiden's face by using humor, sharing the highlights of her day with him, and by acknowledging his gifts and talents. Upon seeing his Big Sister, Heiden immediately lights up and runs to greet her. "I look forward to seeing Chereese every week and it makes my day when she comes to visit!" says Heiden. Likewise, Chereese says that seeing her Little Brother has become the highlight of her Thursdays.

Big Brothers Big Sisters of Honolulu – Little Brother Brandon & Big Brother Christopher

Six-year-old Brandon lives with his mother Rie in transitional housing - before that they lived in a domestic violence shelter. For the past few years Brandon has experienced neglect from his father and witnessed severe verbal abuse directed at his mother. Still, Rie describes Brandon as "a very sweet child that will bring tissues to wipe my tears when I am sad." Lacking a male influence in his life, Rie reached out to find a Big Brother for Brandon. They could not have been more excited to meet Big Brother Christopher! "I don't have to worry about anything when Brandon is with Chris. We are so grateful for Big Brothers Big Sisters," Rie says. The pair spends time together every Sunday and Christopher has introduced Brandon to many new experiences. They even have a super secret special handshake! "I've learned patience. My mind is going a million miles a minute but his is going a trillion miles. It's an interesting dynamic. I'm learning tons from him," says Big Brother Christopher. Little Brother Brandon says, "This program is awesome!"




Big Brothers Big Sisters of Kauai – Little Brother Blayke & Big Brother Wyatt

"I want to make a difference in someone's life" were Wyatt's thoughts when he enrolled in the Big Brothers Big Sisters Kekaha Elementary School Program. As a senior at Waimea High School and dedicated member of his school's athletics programs, Wyatt brings the same level of commitment and excellence that he exhibits on the various athletic fields to his partnership with Little Brother Blayke. Blayke's mother Maxine has seen the impact of her son's relationship with his Big Brother when Blayke lights up and asks questions like, "Do I get to bring my Big Brother home?" Maxine says, "The smile on Blayke's face when he talks about Wyatt is just heartwarming to me. Wyatt is a wonderful mentor to Blayke and he often makes it a point to attend my son's football games." Blayke shares, "I like my Big Brother Wyatt because we both love to play sports and because he is a good example for me."

Big Brothers Big Sisters of Maui - Little Brother Dylan & Big Brother Henry

Little Brother Dylan grew up moving from homeless shelters to low-income housing units with a mother who was struggling to make a living and raise three children by herself. Dylan did not receive special attention at home as his mom was very busy trying to make a better life for her children, and he was ultimately held back in school because of emotional and academic challenges. Ever since Big Brother Henry came along in 2008, life has been looking much better for Dylan. Dylan is doing exceptionally well in school, constantly maintaining a 4.0 GPA, and he is a happier person, getting along with his family much better than before. "Henry has positively impacted all our lives," Dylan's mom says. "He is a blessing to Dylan." Dylan and Henry have forged an amazing bond that will last a lifetime. Big Brother Henry can not imagine what life would be like without his Little Brother and when asked what being a Big means to him, Henry says, "We will always be there for each other, the lifting hands when one falls down, the eyes to watch each other's back, the heart to share one another's grief, and the smile to share the joys. Because we will never grow too old for each other, our relationship thrives outside of time. For that I will always be grateful for becoming a Big."



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
